

Create an educational landscape for the city that increases the number of high-quality academic opportunities for Camden families, while increasing fiscal sustainability for district schools.











District-wide, the number of school buildings has remained constant since 2017-18, even as District-wide enrollment has continued to decline.

#### Top facilities concerns from parents and staff

- Average school building is over 60+ years
- 12+ instructional days lost last year due to emergency facilities failures

#### Each year, we typically spend:

- \$4m in scheduled repairs & maintenance
- \$3-5m in emergency repairs

## Aging systems & infrastructure could fail at any time:

 We have identified \$122m in emergent and urgent projects on the horizon. Aging facilities + deferred maintenance = Roadblocks to student health, safety, success



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


#### **Accelerating Student Achievement: NJSLA**




#### January 2019

- 31 Findings Found in Full/partial Compliance

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
